# White House Happenings -

Socio Economic and Climate Equity — As I previously mentioned last quarter, during the Colorado listening Sessions on Climate Action the topic of low income/ potentially impacted socio economic classes being targeted by the Oil and Gas Industry was presented. As this idea is being used more and more it is becoming a new tactic of the Federal environmental justice agenda. As many of you have seen in the news the House Bill 1512 ("CLEAN Future Act,") is the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee and largely claims to deal with transitioning the country to renewable energy sources while providing a platform to include all socio — economic groups in the implementation phase. The language regarding the definition of environmental justice can be deemed concerning for all industries targeted by the bill because it could potentially put a stop on permitting in urban areas or rural lands as well. "...or low-income community shall be exposed to a disproportionate burden of the negative human health and environmental impacts of pollution or other environmental hazards."

It's important to mention that because the House Bill is so wide sweeping and impactful they requested a stay on permitting related to the above language until the bill passes and rules enacted, having serious consequences for new facilities.

Order 3395 — As I stated last quarter, The Department of Interior (DOI) stated they will not be renewing the 60 day order requiring administrative (appointed) political officials to approve the processing of Oil and Gas Operation permits on Federal lands. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has resumed the duty. This lift will official take place in June. UPDATE: the DOI recently had a online conference with several industry leaders, environmental groups, tribal leaders, unions, and other impacted organizations to discuss the oil and gas permits program on federal land. The main takeaway was to redo the current incentivized royalty structure to make it exceedingly more cost restrictive to develop oil and gas programs on federal lands. Ultimately it will continue to be an uphill battle to keep existing permits and unlikely to obtain new ones.
